On September 27, 2019 the Pan-African Climate Justice Alliance (PACJA) held the climate change walk which marked the climax of the Global Climate Week. The walk was organized in partnership with OXFAM, 350.ORG, the Kenya Platform for Climate Governance, Christian Aid among others. Mr. Charles Mwangi, the Thematic Lead for Resilient Economies, Societies and People led the walk. He mentioned that the choice of WMI as the final stop was symbolic as this was in honor of the late Prof Wangari Maathai and her efforts in championing climate justice. The theme of the walk was *One Voice Climate Action* focusing majorly on two subthemes: 100% Renewable Energy and Climate Induced Migration and Conflicts. Mr. Alvin Munyasia from OXFAM highlighted the key challenges resulting from climate change as per a study carried out after the Cyclone Indie and Kenneth. The study found that 13 million people were suffering from climate affiliated problems mainly food insecurity and diseases.

Prof. D. Mungai, Director WMI, welcomed anad applauded the efforts of PACJA, their partners and the participants for making an effort to impact change on climate justice. He noted that Wangari Maathai Institute for Peace and Environmental Studies is dedicated to working hand in hand with organizations that front for climate change action. He pointed out that the issue of climate justice is long overdue and that all sectors should play their roles to bring the issue to realization.

The two day festival was held from September 20-21, 2019. This important event was officiated by Prof. Rose Nyikal, Ag. Principal, College of Agriculture and Veterinary Sciences who in her remarks, acknowledged the efforts of disseminating crucial information about healthy and organic food.

Professor David Mungai, Director WMI welcomed the stakeholders and gave a brief overview of the Institute. He also pointed out that WMI is currently working towards establishment of an organic and herbs garden that is meant to educate and benefit the community.

Experiential Learning at the Institute

Solid waste is a key environmental concern not only to the national but also to county governments who may have scanty knowledge that waste is not just waste but a resource. Nairobi County alone generates more than 1500 tons of waste per day which goes uncollected and if collected by private garbage collectors, mostly, ends in the landfills thus contributing to greenhouse gases mostly methane. The Wangari Maathai Institute's January 24, 2019 experiential learning trip for the postgraduate students was held at the Continental Renewable Energy Co Ltd (COREC) to enable engage the company on its waste management initiatives. COREC's contribution to waste management is commendable. The company is playing an important role to reduce the amount of waste in landfills, curb deforestation rates, mitigation of climate change and stem slum proliferation and vandalism.

The company recycles about 100 tons of plastics waste into building materials per month. The hardware is sold to developers whose problem is high material cost thus COREC provides alternative affordable and durable construction products. The Eco-friendly building materials recycled from plastics include poles, pathway cabros besides manufacture of aluminum chain links. These products are ideal for fencing on farms, homes, national parks, forest reserves, and commercial places. A case in point, the plastic poles has been used to fence off and conserve Aberdare Conservancy (a major water tower) which has reduced conflicts between humans and wildlife in the areas. The fence has also become the World longest conservation fence nearly 400km protecting over 2,000 sq. km of the prime forest and water catchment of the Aberdare Conservation Area. Other sister companies to COREC include BENTOS whose core mission is to make briquettes and Vanguard company that manufactures cement.

The COREC is an employer to more than 30 youth self-help groups mostly constituted of street boys and girls. Dr. Oscar Aghan spends time and trains these youth on waste segregation and handling besides linking them with commercial banks. Needless to say, COREC activities are a milestone in the governments' four big agenda particularly manufacturing and affordable housing and remarkably to sustainable development goals 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13.

Learning by Doing at the Institute (SLUSE 2019)

The Wangari Maathai Institute for Peace and Environmental Studies in collaboration with the University of Copenhagen and University of Roskilde, Denmark successfully implemented the 2019 experiential field learning course dubbed, "Sustainable land use management system – (SLUSE)," which is the 7th in series after the SLUSE 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2018. The program was held in in Kibugu, Embu County, from March 1-12, 2019. It incorporated students from various disciplines including environmental governance, agriculture, sociology, anthropology, economics, forestry, livestock production and law and was attended by thirty five (35) students, seventeen (17) international students from both University of Copenhagen and Roskilde University and ten (18) from the University of Nairobi-Wangari Maathai Institute & the Department of Geography and Environmental Studies.

The students were hosted by the local communities for the entire period (12 days). The SLUSE research areas hinged around five (5) themes including the the role of irrigation schemes in improving livelihood, analysis of dairy production and marketing, Macadamia – production and marketing, formal and informal financial institutions for sustainable agricultural practices and agricultural practices for soil fertility management. The students were supervised by the faculty from the Wangari Maathai Institute and from the University of Copenhagen and Roskilde University. The field exercise was concluded with a community feedback meeting during which students presented their preliminary findings and recommendations in a forum attended by the host families, government officers and the general public.

Wangari Maathai Institute launches book on "Forest Resources Utilization, Livelihoods and Conflicts-Synthesis of research under the STAKE project"

The book titled; Forest Resources Utilization, Livelihoods and Conflicts-Synthesis of research under the 'Stabilizing Kenya through Solving Forest Related Conflicts (STAKE) project' was launched on Wednesday, 20th March, 2019 at the Vet Lab Golf Club, Kabete. STAKE Project was an exciting partnership between the Wangari Maathai Institute for Peace and Environmental Studies (WMI), the Green Belt Movement (GBM), Kenya Forest Research Institute (KEFRI) and the University of Copenhagen, Denmark and funded by DANIDA. During its five years period (2012-2016), the project granted scholarships to PhD students and contributed towards stabilizing Kenya by solving forest related conflicts.

Conflict over natural resources is common as result of diverse interests, legal fails and governance structure. The Mau Ecosystem provided an excellent case of such conflicts area, having had a long history of competing claims over forest resources, forest excisions, encroachments, evictions, and violent struggles among ethnic groups. Analysis of access to forest for grazing, wood, water and recreation in multiplicity of legislation, guidelines and practices makes it a good context to study drivers of natural resource conflicts in relation to livelihoods. The book highlights different types of conflict and their drivers resulting from access to benefits accruing from forests. The key drivers being ethnicity, legal pluralism, political incitement, and perception. Stereotyped perceptions of unfairness in granting access to benefits and traditional ethnic animosity are easily fueled into violence. The study results are of immediate policy relevance to communities facing such conflicts and the findings can also be of use in conflict early warning. The book which is a culmination of five years of hard work by a vast range of South and North academicians, researchers, students and members of the East Mau Forest Block adjacent communities will benefit students, community leaders, forest managers, and policy makers.

The event was graced by Prof. Julius Ogeng'o, DVC Academic Affairs who was representing the Vice Chancellor, University of Nairobi, Prof. Stephen G. Kiama, Ag. DVC, Human Resource and Administration among others. In his remarks, Prof. Ogeng'o noted that one of the University's core mandate is to generate, reserve and disseminate information and knowledge through research. On his part, Prof. Kiama passionately reiterated Prof. Wangari Maathai's ideas and efforts towards environmental conservancy which laid the foundation for the establishment of the Wangari Maathai Institute. Notable partners present included; the GBM and KEFRI which assured the Institute of their support on future projects. The STAKE project beneficiaries articulately shared their experiences and noted that meritocracy was clearly evident in the STAKE project enabled its fruition. The project coordinators present were in undisputable agreement that research findings ought to be synthesized and simplified for easy understanding by the communities. The launched book is also dedicated to the late Mr. B.C. Muthee, one of the scholarship beneficiaries and Tutorial Fellow at WMI who passed on a year before his graduation. Every participant of the launch was issued a copy of the book. WMI sincerely appreciates all those involved in the STAKE project including the Southern and Northern Teams led by Prof. R. G. Wahome and Prof. Vibeke Vindelov respectively among others. WMI also extends its appreciation to DANIDA for funding the project.

Seminar on Technology and Innovation Policies

NACOSTI Chief Science Analyst Margaret Maimba shared insights on the role of NACOSTI in formulation and implementation of public policies with staff, students, policy experts and practitioners at the Wangari Maathai Institute on Wednesday November 13, 2019.

She started by highlighting the lack of proper definition of public policy and the existence of policies in many forms such as written statements, oral or even presidential decrees. The NACOSTI science Analyst elaborated the stages of policy formulation as initiation, research, negotiations and public participation, drafting, cabinet approval, parliamentary approval, ascent by the president/governor and finally publication. She underscored that policy formulation is not a preserve of a few people but can originate from any person and brought to the attention of the relevant institution. She noted that the constitution offers the foundations for the involvement of all persons in decision making through the principle of public participation in policy formulation.

She urged researchers to play their role in policy formulation by providing evidence-based information to policy makers which enriches policy formulation. Students were encouraged to write policy briefs for their theses as the best way to communicate their research findings to policy makers. Among the roles of NACOSTI include accrediting research institutions and linking with researchers and academic institutions to provide evidence-based policy advice to the government. She concluded by noting that duplication of roles, bureaucracies in administration and donor influence are among the challenges facing policy formulation and implementation in Kenya.

Prof. Nzioka J. Muthama, deputy director, WMI, moderated the discussion where participants including Prof. David Mungai, Director, WMI took turns to react to the presentation by Margaret Maimba. Accreditation of research institutions, acquisition of research permits, lobbying during policy formulation and preservation of scientific knowledge were discussed at length.

Seminar on The Future of Forests: REDD+ Readiness

The Wangari Maathai Institute (WMI) hosted a seminar on the "Future of Forests; REDD+ Readiness" on November 27, 2019. The seminar was delivered by Prof. Nzioka J. Muthama, Deputy director, WMI, Dr. Jane Mutune and Dr. Bessy Kathambi and attracted a wide range of participants including students, staff, policy experts and practitioners among others. The seminar introduced participants on the REDD+ process in Kenya and where the country is regarding the implementation of REDD+.

REDD+ (Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and forest Degradation and the role of conservation, sustainable management of forests and enhancement of forest carbon stocks in developing countries) aims at mitigating climate change by reducing net emissions of GHGs through enhanced forest management in developing countries. It involves payments to developing countries that prevent deforestation or degradation that would otherwise have taken place. REDD+ takes a phase approach with three phases - Readiness, Implementation and Result Based Action. Kenya is at the Readiness phase.

In her presentation, Dr. Mutune noted that forests are a key adaptation strategy to climate change mitigation because of their role as carbon sinks. She highlighted the existing mitigation opportunities in the country which include participatory approach (good governance), afforestation and re-afforestation. She emphasized that in developing a national strategy plan for REDD+ there ought to be consideration of indigenous people, gender and full participation of relevant stakeholders. Dr. Kathambi gave insights into the Forest Reference Emission Level/Forest Reference Level, an element required for REDD+ readiness. She pointed outed that forest cover has been on the decline over the recent years due to increased demand for farmland and settlement. Kenya has five water towers which if properly managed can form a good carbon sink. She discussed case studies of Ghana and Brazil as some of the success examples of the REDD+ program. Prof. Muthama wrapped up the presentation sessions by a presentation on REDD+ safeguards and safeguard information systems. REDD+ safeguards ensure no harm from REDD+ activities and aim to enhance social and environmental benefits. He emphasized the importance of having an accessible safeguard information system and the vital role of research and information in moving to the next phase of REDD+.

Participants took turn to react to the presentations and key issues in the discussion included the role of leadership in REDD+, participatory forest governance and the opportunities for REDD+.

Guest Lecturers and students share their experiential knowledge

Mr. Gitau James Kinyua delivered a seminar on evaluation of efficiency and adoption of biochar pro-



ducing cooking system in smallholder farms in Kwale County, Kenya at the Wangari Mathai Institute (WMI) on October 1, 2019. Mr. Gitau is a PhD student at the WMI. The seminar presented the opportunity to share the findings of his PhD thesis and also get feedback on his work from those present. His study aimed at reducing indoor air pollution and associated health problems and reduction in firewood consumption. The gasifier cookstove studied has more benefits than open fire three-stone traditional cooking system because its designed for efficient use of fuel, emits less

smoke and can also be used for charcoal production. Key points of discussion in the seminar included the cost of the gasifier which may be prohibitive to majority of the rural population. However, formulation of supportive policies could enhance long term usage of the new stove and lower the cost.

Prof. Muthama highlighted that the Institute was delighted to formalize the partnership with EIK which will facilitate joint efforts in providing practical solutions to environmental issues.

On his part, Mr. Nzoka indicated that there is need for the institutions involved in production, operation and regulation like the Universities, EIK and NEMA respectively to work together to produce demand driven graduates. He emphasized that all stakeholders have a critical role to play in conversation of the environment and there is need to emulate Prof. Wangari Maathai's spirit of reaching out to the grassroots community and bridge the gap between theory and practice. Mr. Nzoka donated two copies of a Magazine titled, "Focus on Property," a July – August 2019 Complementary copy to the Institute.

Prof. Muthama indicated that it was exciting to forge partnership between the two institutions which provides room for actualization of ideas from both institutions based on five key areas including capacity building on environmental management, environmental education and awareness programmes, research and dissemination of environmental knowledge, suitable financing arrangements for joint activities and other areas of common interest as stipulated in the memorandum of understanding. He encouraged that both institutions should therefore, work towards implementing these activities for environmental conservation to realize sustainable development.


